Your Board At Work

Your Board met with the Chairs of Committees to discuss follow-up actions for the *Future Directions* which were listed at the workshop the Club held. Arrangements are in place to incorporate the feedback from the Dinner Meeting as well, and so provide the opportunity for all members to have input to this important strategy document.

The combined meeting discussed the work of the various committees and the projects that Brisbane North has undertaken in the last five years, such as the Literacy Package for early years, support for the fistula hospital in Addis Abbaba, the sponsorship of 10 women to undertake the 'escape fast' self defence course, the advancement grants, the public conference on anorexia and our support for the Foundation for Survivors of Domestic Violence.

The Mission statement of the SOW Service Committee reflects their special mission to explore and develop ways in which the club's commitment can be implemented.

The Board noted that the new Manuals for Zonta members is now ready and will either be printed or copied for all members to ensure consistency of information and action.

The Board discussed a modest increase in Annual Dues, from \$130 pa to \$135 pa and the overall budge for the year 2000 as well as the impact of the GST. A survey form has been designed for all members to have input to the decision about the Dinner Meeting costs and possible change of venue.

The monies collected from the Millenium Promise will be allocated to a project which needs such support. Members are encouraged to read the ZISVAW report and look at the *Future Directions* document for inspiration.

The Board also endorsed Joan Sheridan as the Convenor for the next Zonta Fair and commends it to members for their support.

Letter from Janet Montrose

Happy New Year and, as the Chinese say: Sunlee filo!

Thank you for sending the newsletter. I enjoyed reading it very much.

I've been to Vietnam for Christmas. We stayed in the Metropole Hotel in Hanoi. How different it was from a Christmas in Australia. Very French. I think that we were the only Australians staying there as most people were speaking French. On Christmas Day, we were seated next to two young Australians, backpackers from Adelaide, and we enjoyed the conversation with them. They were spending their weekly food allowance on one lunch! I was so relieved not to be backpacking!

Hanoi, the capital city, is alive and very busy. With beautiful old French architecture, it is so third world. One street hawker followed us for 2 hours to sell us a Viet Cong hat for US\$2.00. Old women earn a living selling cups of tea and a cigarette or a drag on a bong squatting on the footpath. Everywhere are bicycles and scooters. Beep, beep! Peep! The law demands that anyone overtaking sounds the horn. The cacophony is unceasing. In spite of their obvious poverty, the Vietnamese people are very happy and so pacifist. There is no road rage at all. Compared with Australia, it is a really accepting, compromising society. Of course, the Mercedes ride from the airport to the hotel was a different world from the one we viewed.

On Boxing Day we flew to Hue, the ancient imperial capital and it was a different world again from Hanoi. We stayed at the Morin Hotel which was the university before the war. Hue is very rural, yet again the people are well-nourished and seem contented with their lot. Old women run along carrying balanced baskets, wearing coolie hats, selling mandarins and sugar beets. They have happy faces and seem healthy. It's difficult to reconcile the communist politics with the rapacious capitalism that we endured every time we walked the streets. In the markets, food is abundant and the fresh vegetables are mouth-watering in colour and variety. Everything one could wish to buy is there. Yes, I have yet another pair of silk pyjamas! If anyone would like any silk pjs, just email me before I return to Brisbane in July.

Now it's back to work in earnest. Students here endure a rigorous system of exams. based on a 3 term system. It is archaic and in need of immediate reform. Unfortunately, the teachers are ill-equipped to innovate the necessary changes. In spite of the dinosauric conditions, I enjoy motivating/encouraging the students to have the confidence to speak English. That's my role and I use every trick to get them to talk.

My only disappointment is that the Zontians here have not contacted me so my membership of Zonta will lapse. In retrospect, I think that they would not welcome an Australian into their clubs as then they might have to speak English. Most Chinese here think that they 'lose face' - a huge issue here- if they cannot speak English well. The school principal has never spoken to me and uses the younger female deputy to communicate with me. Fortunately, she is very fluent and we have developed a good friendship. It helps that she has a flat here on the Gold Coast as well.

I wish the North Brisbane Zontians well in their endeavours in 2000 and if I can catch a meeting when I return to Brisbane for the long Summer holiday (here), I will phone you. Best wishes,

Zonta International Violence against Women message

(from Diane Jeans, via Jennie Watt, Brisbane North's contact person).

On average, over the past ten years in Australia, 125 women have been murdered each year - 90% by men, and 60% by an intimate partner. (Australia Institute of Criminology reported in the Courier Mail 23/9/99)

In Queensland, between 1994 and 1998, 62 women and 6 children were killed in domestic violence incidents. This represents women who can no longer be heard, and the children who will never reach their potential. Spare a moment's thought for these irreplaceable losses to our community.

We should all be well aware by now that ZISVAW – the Zonta International Strategies to Eliminate Violence against women and children – is now here to stay – the International commitment is that this program will continue until such violence is eradicated. It is now a central part of the Zontian message and needs to become part of the Zontian culture.

If some Zontians are already weary of this topic – then the best option is to get into the fight against violence, or else you are going to be hearing about it for a longer time. But what is it? It is domestic violence, it is rape and sexual assault, it is child abuse and in some cultures, it is genital circumcision. It has many faces, it is perpetrated for many different reasons – but at the end of any analysis it is violence and abuse of a person because of their gender.

This ZISVAW strategy is about harnessing Zonta expertise, resources, commitment and drive to address a problem which has an international recognition, which has national and state focus, but which happens in our communities, in our backyards.

The question is - what are we - in District 24 - going to do about it?

Well, as a start we must be informed. We must face the unpleasant factor that violence against women exists at all levels in society, it affected our mothers and grandmothers, it affects women like us, and it will affect our daughters and grand-daughters if we do not act. It is not some else's problem. Learn the facts, listen to the experts, listen to survivors, be aware and take that awareness with us into the community, within our business lives and our private lives.

We asked each club to nominate a member to represent them and carry the message within the organisation. We ask that each club has a regular space in their Newsletter for ZISVAW matters. We ask that each club has at least one guest speaker this year to talk about the issue of domestic violence. We need to recognise (that is, become cognisant again ,*Ed*), that it is easy to give money or donate goods to women who are seen as less fortunate than us. The challenge is to take that further, to speak out against violence and to advocate change.

We have formed a partnership with the Federal Government to participate in the Business Against Domestic Violence initiative. Obviously this matter affects workplace absenteeism, sick leave, etc. In Brisbane, we have joined networks and devised strategies to take the challenge to the business sector, such as obtaining business sponsorship for a Media Award for the best DV Awareness reporting, organising Jim Hardeman, the man responsible for establishing the US program to come and speak and developing the concept of a trust fund to support services and prevention activities.

These are projects which we could commit to on a long term basis, which would have a significant impact on women. How about formulating something in the Zonta Club of Brisbane North?

These speakers were very inspiring and spoke about their own journeys to success. They talked about the ways they coped with failure and how they didn't let it get them down, it just made them more determined than ever to go on with life.

Domestic Violence - an update

"The Brisbane City Council, in conjunction with the State and Federal Governments, is bringing to Australia Jim Hardeman to participate in a range of speaking engagements about the implications of family (domestic violence) in the workplace and the importance of developing protocols, procedures and guidelines to prevent workplace violence."

Latest e-mail from Diane Jeans who is the Chairperson for ZISVAW

'The next area of work is the issue of Business and Domestic Violence and the recent visit by Jim Hardeman from the US has inspired us to move forward of this project. At the moment we are commissioning research on the impact of DV on workplace and the business sector in an Australian context (funded by the Brisbane City Council) and working to adapt the US program - the CEO challenge - to the Australian environment. I will be able to distribute this information later in the year, together with some suggestions about the concept may be taken up in your local area."

The Brisbane City Council has also set up a project team to appoint referral officers and train these in recognising and referring individual employees who have been affected by Domestic Violence. This will be one of the first 'businesses' in Australia to recognise the impact of a violent home to its employees.

Zonta's Intergenerational Literacy Project

This has resulted in a publication:- Sweet Sisters and Other Secrets, an anthology of personal anecdotes about people from different backgrounds doing ordinary and extraordinary things.

One of the authors of the Draft Document for Reconciliation, the author Ms Jackie Huggins, will present a view, for our members' consideration, after the Document has been ratified, sometime in June/July.

Letter from Janet Montrose

Hello there.

It seems quite a time since I emailed you that I would send another item for the newsletter after Easter.

We had 11 days off for the Easter holiday so I went for 4 days to Xi'an to see the excavation of the terracotta warriors and the other historical sites originating in Buddhism and Confucianism. If you've ever wondered where that saying "set in stone' came from, it is from Confucius' decree to inscribe his tenets into stellae so that no errors could be made in copying them.

They had a special 'forest of stone' which contains all the original stone inscriptions. Quite fascinating.

Since the discovery of the terracotta army in 1975, Xi'an has become an important tourist destination with all of the trarara of capturing the tourist dollar, especially if its US\$!! Unfortunately, the air pollution is severe and it was difficult to see into the distance. The local tour guide dismissed it euphemistically as 'dust haze'! We were rather blunt with our description of air pollution. The other disturbing aspect of China is the huge unemployed population who have no social security. Everyone pays for education and health and their old age. All along the streets, huge groups of unemployed men in shabby communist suits stand with mops, buckets, brushes hoping someone will give them a job. Poverty stalks them all.

As for South Korea, what a different scene that is. Marie Gracey met me at the airport with one of the fathers of the children who attend the school where she teaches. As one would expect with Marie, I had a fabulous time. We were driven through one of the prettiest parts of the country, very reminiscent of Japan. The people are well-dressed and appear to be very

prosperous. Everything is immaculate and very modern. I loved it.

Marie is enjoying herself and learning so much every week. Fortunately, she has some expatriate company amongst the Canadian and American population. Her life there is so different from mine in Hong Kong. I have a huge support group whereas she is really quite isolated in her school. On the day that I left, the science room caught fire and there was a huge blaze with angry orange flames flaring out of the second floor window. It was really frightening. So I decided to go out to the airport early to be one fewer body to look after in the mayhem.

I send my best wishes to the North Brisbane Zonta Club and I hope to attend the August meeting.

President's Message

For those of you who do a bit of reading from time to time this quote will be familiar:- 'the limits of my language are the limits of my world'
Yes, it was Wittgenstein who wrote that. If we can't describe something in our language, English, it limits our experience in some way.
Fortunately, I came to English a bit late in life, so there are still some things that are very fresh to me. Those of you who have learned another language will appreciate how good English is and how good it sounds after you haven't heard it for a while.

This same concept can be applied to behaviour, of course. The limits of my behaviour are the limits of my world, If we can't behave in a certain way, it limits our experience. You may have seen the 7.30 Report which documented an item about a Sydney High School where the boys, habitually truants and aggressive, learned that they could dance, sing and play music, even put on a musical and enjoy doing it. What an eye-opener this was for some. They were slightly amazed at themselves being able to do all that and not feel like a sissy.

We, as busy professional women can apply similar limits to our world, without really meaning to do this. The limits of my language and my behaviour are what limits me, personally, and my world, generally. As a service organisation we are asked to improve the status of women by eradicating violence, helping women to access quality education, make sure they have equal rights under the Law and that they can fully participate in the economy and political life of our country. We, as concerned, busy, professional women, are meant to have fun doing all that. It is difficult to communicate these aims to women who speak another language, or women who have had too short an education to learn their (our) native language well. It is difficult to feel that we have anything to offer those women whose behaviour does not match our own. It is no wonder, we think, that if they don't learn English, or how to read, or misbehave, fall foul of the law, that they ended up this way or that. Besides, doing anything to help them is not all that much fun, anyway. So, we limit ourselves, as an organisation and as a person.

Why did I think of this, suddenly, I hear you ask? Well, I had a look at the list of women's groups who use *Infolink* (where the Board now meets), and their aims. The Older Women's Network is worried about health and aging, The Barred Women's group is worried about how to get an education now that they are no longer in jail. The Gurrlpower group is learning to use computers so that they can do some office jobs. The Murri Women's group is using it as a safe venue for their mutual support group, away from their men and other disrupters. The Service Committees in our Area will be collecting information on the needs to fund some initiatives again shortly. And I'd like to think that we will be expanding our service and eliminating the limits on our world, especially our service world.

FROM OUR ENVIRONMENT COMMITTEE

Some interesting information published in the latest issue of Green Connections. The average Melbourne household:

- Uses an average of 270,000 litres of drinking water each year;
- Sends approximately 175,500 litres of water down the sewer which ends up in the bay or Bass Strait:
- Collects over 100,000 litres/year of rain water from its roof and discharges it into stormwater drains, then via creeks into the bay - carrying with it oil and litter;
- Contributes between 5-7 tonnes of CO₂ emissions to our atmosphere each year;
- Produces 7 tonnes/year of solid waste.

Although the survey was done in Melbourne the figures for Brisbane would be very similar. How many generations can assimilate such a large footprint?

AN EXTRA VERY IMPORTANT DATE FOR YOUR DIARY.

THE WORLD MARCH OF WOMEN 2000 demanding an end to violence against women, women's poverty, and insisting on real equality between women and men will take place on 15th October starting from Suncorp Park (cnr Adelaide and George Streets), leaving at 11.30 AM to walk to the City Botanical Gardens where there will be a cultural festival and other activities celebrating women and marking the conclusion of AUSTCARE Refugee Week. If you do not wish to march you can still support its goals by joining a journey on a Virtual Bus. The Queensland Domestic Violence Services Network has embarked on an event that will take the form of a virtual bus trip beginning in Far North Queensland on 15th September and ending in Brisbane on 15th October. During its month long journey women may "Jump aboard" and become part of the Global march that will end in New York on 17th October at the United Nations with millions of signed petitions demanding economic and social justice for all women. HOW TO GET ON THE BUS. Visit the DVRC website at www.dvrc.org.au from the 15th September and find your way to the bus terminal and follow the instructions to be placed on the passenger list. If you don't have access to the internet you can telephone the DVRC and ask for the information officer who will book you on. A small nominal fee will be charged to get on the bus and all proceeds will be channelled to emergency assistance for women and children escaping domestic violence. At the Queensland level a list of all passengers will be sent to the Queensland Premier to make our voice heard here.

The objectives of the march and bus journey are identical to those of ZONTA. Here is an opportunity for all of us to practice that "advocacy thing" we all talk so much about. LET'S DO IT!!

MANDATORY SENTENCES - The Mikado had the punishment worked out for a lady who dyed her hair a chemical yellow or stained her grey hair puce or pinched her figure (I assume with corsets). He planned that she be painted with vigour with permanent walnut juice so that the punishment fit the crime! The issue of mandatory sentencing has hit the headlines recently mainly as a result of the Northern Territory "3 strikes and you're in" provisions for juveniles (children in the eyes of the Law) convicted of property offences. The authorities look at it from the viewpoint that, having been convicted on two prior occasions, the offender will be incarcerated no matter what their circumstances or the circumstances of the offences. My view is that the authorities have been made aware on two prior occasions that all is not well in the life of this young person and twice the authorities have failed to help effectively. AND NOW FOR A BIT OF HISTORY. When we join Zonta we become aware of the various awards and grants but little of their history. So this for those of us who have joined the club within the past seven or eight years. This program was started during the 1990-1992 Biennium implementing one of Young Women in Public Affairs the important strategies of the 1985 Nairobi Conference of the UN Decade for Women - "For true equality to become a reality for women, the sharing of power on equal terms with men must become a major strategy" And so the purpose of the award is to create awareness and sensitivity in young women about their place as responsible and equal citizens and as potential leaders in their and the wider community. At our club level our nominee receives a Certificate and \$250. At District level the nominee to compete at the international level receives a Ccertificate and \$500 and the final winner receives \$1000 and a Certificate at the International level. The Advancement Grant. This grant was established in 1991 and is worth \$1000 today targeting women with limited or curtailed opportunities to achieve a specific goal that would advance them socially and economically. They can spend it on education, books, travel, accommodation, child care and similar things. Jane M. Klausman Women in Business Scholarships. The first scholarships were awarded in 1999. Applicants must be qualified to enrol in the 3rd or 4th year of an accredited university or college level business program. Worldwide there are five annual scholarships worth \$US4000 each. At our club level, we give our candidate to District level an award of \$250 and a Certificate.


