# Reflections on the Areas 1 & 3 Meeting by Mel Ablitt

The Zonta Area I & 3 meeting was held at the Queensland Cricketers' Club on Saturday, I6 March. Our club was the best proportionally represented club, with 5 members attending. This was my first area meeting, and my first opportunity to meet and interact with Zontians from other clubs.

While there were many presentations and topics discussed during the day, my highlights included:

- Judith Anderson set the scene with Zonta "The Big Picture", which put Zonta into context with the other Service organisations operating locally, nationally and globally. This was particularly educational for me, as I did not realise just how many Service organisations there are out there. Judith's passion and enthusiasm for Zonta shone though, driving home the importance of aligning our Club's service projects with the Convention for the Elimination of Discrimination Against Women (CEDAW) articles and the Millennium Development Goals.
- There were two touching stories of "Zonta What it Means to Me", one by a long-standing member and another by a new member. A common theme of friendship, wanting to give back to the community and provide a better future for women ran through both presentations.
- A presentation on Social Media confirmed that we are headed down the right path with our club's Facebook page. My next step is to discuss Twitter with our club.

I found the presentation on my generation, Generation Y, most interesting. Adam Penberthy from Fresh Advertising, a fellow Gen-Y, discussed how our generation does not like to be "tied down" or "make commitments", and prompted a number of lively discussions about the Zonta membership model moving forward. I hope that Adam's message made it across, especially if Zonta wishes to engage with and fully harness the potential of my generation.

The Area 1 & 3 meeting topics generated a lot of discussion throughout the day, including during breaks. It was refreshing to hear that other Zonta clubs are doing a comparable amount of fundraising activities and projects.

While there were some topics that met with change resistance, the overall energy for, and recognition of, the need to change was very encouraging to hear. I left the day feeling revitalised and excited for my future as a member of Zonta.

# **57th Session of the Commission on the Status of Women**

The agreed conclusions adopted by the United Nations 57th Session of the Commission on the Status of Women (CSW) condemn in the strongest terms the pervasive violence against women and girls and call for increased attention and accelerated action for prevention and response. By adopting this document, governments have made clear that discrimination and violence against women and girls has no place in the 21st century. They have reaffirmed their commitment and responsibility to undertake concrete action to end violence against women and girls and promote and protect women's human rights and fundamental freedoms.

## Member Profile - Jill Hedley, Club President

At the area meeting we were reminded that one of the criteria for membership of Zonta was to be or have been in a decision making position in the course of one's career. Although I am first and foremost a primary school teacher, I have filled a number of other positions within that sphere that certainly involved decision making.

I was a member of the team that developed the 1987 Years 1-10 Mathematics Syllabus and wrote support material including Year Level Source Books and materials for professional development. As an Education Advisor, I ran many seminars and workshops to assist in the implementation of that Syllabus and drove many kilometres visiting schools. Later, I worked in Curriculum Branch writing policy documents and other materials.

I also worked with the Board of Senior Secondary School Studies as a consultant in the development and implementation of the Short Response Items section of the Core Skills test. At the beginning, I was the only primary teacher to be involved. There was certainly a lot of decision making involved in what was then an innovative assessment process.

For some years I was on the executive committee of the Queensland Association of Mathematics Teachers and achieved the unusual distinction for a female primary teacher of becoming president. As a result, I was on the National Committee for five years as well as other policy committees at State Level.

After being back in the classroom for a number of years I again had a spell as an Education Advisor attempting to implement the Student Performance Standards. Although I spent most of my years in the classroom, I was working half my time as a Senior Testing Officer with Testing Branch when I made the decision to retire.

As a female teacher I was paid ninety percent of the male wage and was forced to resign when I married. The few women who had achieved non classroom positions were only in the Infant Schools. There was almost no career path for women. As we have moved from slates to I-pads, there have been dramatic improvements to the status of women in Education.

However, there are still barriers, overt and covert, to be overcome. It is also important that the young women of today understand how far we have come and continue to advance the status of women in all professions. PAGE 4 APRIL 2013
