President's PatterCONVICTION, COMMITMENT, COURAGE

Our calendar year started off with a well attended strategic planning exercise in early February. Our goal, to improve the lives of women and girls locally and globally, was revisited and programs planned to help us to meet that goal. At the meeting we planned the year's fundraising activities, allocated responsibilities and discussed the efficacy of our current activities.

Since then we have had several successful fundraising events including two Bunnings Sausage Sizzles and an International Women's Day, function that was worthwhile from both an advocacy and financial point of view. See the report and pictures in this newsletter.

In the service area, our club held a working bee to sew breast cushions for women recovering breast surgery in early April. We have also committed to working with other clubs in our area to train facilitators to present the Love Bites program in local high schools. This is a program, devised by the National Council for the Prevention of Child Abuse and Neglect, that teaches respectful relationships and violence prevention to Year 9 and 10 students. We feel that it will compliment the RAVES program that Zonta Pine Rivers currently sponsors in our local high schools.

At the March Meeting we discussed the fee structure and cost of using the Eatons Hill Tavern as our meeting place. In order to maintain this venue we are required to pay for a minimum of 20 meals each months. Our past data shows that there will be months where that threshold is not reached. A motion was passed at the meeting to enforce the rule that states that members should not miss more than two meeting per year. In the case that a member attends less than eight meeting per year they will be asked to contribute the dinner fee of \$25 to make up the shortfall. This motion was passed unanimously.

I feel encouraged by the number of our members who engage with our projects and activities and contribute their time, ideas and effort. I am only too aware of the pressure of work and family commitments for many of our members and hope that we take those diverse circumstances into account when planning. I thank you all for the contribution you make to furthering our Zonta goals and look forward to working with you to this end.

Zonta International Foundation Update

ZI Foundation Ambassador, District 22

So far in this biennium, 2014 to 30th June, 2016, District 22 has contributed to the ZI Foundation \$135,232.69. This is from Clubs of the District 22, and from individual member contributions.
