Many thanks to Marilyn, who has been working tirelessly with government meetings regarding the funding of the RISE project. There have been some hiccups in the process but they are re-considering our application. Marilyn's research has shown that exposure to domestic violence results in children having a 30% higher chance of police/criminal intervention by age 16 and more than 1/3 of all homicides in Queensland are related to domestic violence. This, combined with the recent news that 1 child per week, who is identified as at risk by Child Safety; dies in Australia, is evidence that we need to be vocal about the need for support, education and intervention with families affected by domestic violence.

As Zontians, we can action Goal No.5 from the Sustainable Development Goals (United Nations), which is: *Achieve gender equality and empower all women and girls*. This includes; ending discrimination and eliminating violence against women. Goal No. 5 is pivotal to our work in Zonta and the groups that we support, including the RISE project.

Many thanks to Jillie who has been looking after our dinner bookings for the past few years. She passed on our thanks with a herb garden present to Urban Expresso and explained that we had outgrown the venue but have enjoyed our time and their lovely dinners. Jo Ashburner will now be chasing us all up for numbers for dinner meetings so please get back to her with guests or apologies. I look forward to seeing you all on Tuesday at 6.00 pm for a 'French affair'.

# The 'bloody difficult women' of the world are getting bloody close to leadership

Watch out: the 'difficult women' of the world are coming, and they're after the biggest prizes in leadership.

From Hillary Clinton's race for the White House, to the two female Conservative leaders fought it out to become the next British Prime Minister, the rise of the 'difficult woman' shows no signs of abating.

Indeed the problem is concerning. These women aren't just determined leaders, like their male equivalents would be, they're females who stand their ground and have somehow managed to knock down everything in their way -- including a few men, no doubt -- to get the the top. At least that's what Ken Clarke, a 76 year old Conservative politician, said when he didn't

realise the cameras were rolling during a television interview. He went on to compare her to Margaret Thatcher saying, "she won't be any more difficult than that." And so social media responded with the hashtag, #bloodydifficultwoman and #proudtobedifficult with people all over the world supporting May and coming up with suggestions for why she really might be considered difficult

Is it because she's gotten to where she is and stuck around, having survived six years in the Cabinet as Interior minister? Is it because she's somehow managed to break through in politics in the first place, when she should have been knocked off the ladder long ago? Is it because she's more intelligent than most of the men around her? Is it because she won't back down? Is it because she continues talking, even when a man attempts to speak over her? Is it becomes she's strong and assertive? Is it because she's passionate about her views and is therefore unlikely to be moved?
