INTERNATIONAL LITERACY DAY

8TH SEPTEMBER 2007

Literacy is a cause for celebration as there are now close to four billion literate people in the world. However, literacy for all – children, youth and adults – is still an unaccomplished goal and an ever moving target. A combination of ambitious goals, insufficient and parallel efforts, inadequate resources and strategies and continued under-estimation of the magnitude and complexity of the task accounts for this unmet goal. Lessons learnt over recent decades shows that meeting the goal of universal literacy calls not only for more effective efforts but also for renewed political will and for doing things differently at all levels, locally, nationally and internationally.

In its resolution [A/RES/56/116](#), the General Assembly proclaimed the ten year period beginning 1 January, 2003 the **United Nations Literacy Decade**. In resolution [A/RES/57/166](#), the Assembly welcomed the **International Plan of Action for the Decade** and decided that UNESCO should take a coordinating role in activities undertaken at the international level within the framework of the Decade.



April 2, 2007 a new UN report on the right to education for persons with disabilities calls for intensified efforts in inclusive education. The report contains numerous inputs from UNESCO and addresses the normative framework, monitoring and various challenges to implementation. It ends with a forward looking set of recommendations. www.unitednationseducational

Inspiring Women!!

NANETTE ROGERS

Alice Springs Crown Prosecutor

Nanette Rogers never wanted to be 'the story' but when she risked her entire legal career to speak out about the entrenched culture of sexual assault and violence in indigenous communities, the impact of her words was immense. It has been an extraordinary year for the Alice Springs crown prosecutor. On May 15, 2006, in a sensational interview with Tony Jones on the ABC's Lateline program, Rogers set out case after case of **murder and sexual violence against women, girls and, most shockingly, babies**.

The former defence barrister, who once made her living defending Aboriginal men, said the crimes were beyond most people's comprehension and that Australia needed to hear about the problem. At once, politicians came under intense pressure to act. The details Rogers gave, along with her passion and perspective, meant the nation paid attention. Says Tony Jones: "Nanette Rogers is one of those people who values the truth above an easy life. Where others witnessed the same horrors and kept quiet, Nanette cannot take her unflinching gaze off the victims – **the children and the women** - who bear the brunt of physical and sexual abuse. It seems to me she has no time for political correctness, which encourages silence in the face of hard truths."

Rogers has had a long career looking out for the powerless. She received an arts-law degree from the Australian National University before doing a Masters at Sydney University, and worked at Redfern Legal Centre between 1979 and 1989. In 1990, after moving to Alice Springs, she found herself defending Aboriginal men accused of violent crimes. By 1992 the increasingly disillusioned barrister had authored a paper with a friend called '**Crossing The Last Frontier: Problems Facing Aboriginal Women, Victims of Rape in Central Australia**.'

The following year, she set up a women's legal service in central Australia and by 1999, the mother of three, had crossed sides to become a prosecutor. "I ended up getting sick of acting for violent Aboriginal men and putting up the same old excuses when I was appearing for them. I draw immense inspiration from indigenous people, and am especially inspired by the women who manage to give evidence against Aboriginal offenders charged with serious criminal offences involving interpersonal violence. Many Aboriginal people in central Australia live chaotic and dysfunctional lives in remote communities and town camps, with daily violence, poverty and alcohol. When witnesses and victims come to give their evidence they have probably been subjected to pressure from kin not to talk about the offence, and have had other succeeding tragic events happen to their lives, such as premature death from car accidents, alcohol abuse, suicide or homicide. Additionally, they may have been subjected to other interpersonal violence from new partners or other kin. That such people can give evidence in a formal courtroom setting, which is an intimidating and frightening environment for most people, shows extraordinary courage and determination. I am most grateful for the circumstances in which I live and operate compared to the lives they are born into and forced to live. Other people, I am sure, feel the same way and wish for Aboriginal women and children to live in safety." **FEATURE The Weekend Australian August 4-5**



'It ain't easy being PNG'

PNG is facing the highest incidence of HIV in the PACIFIC Region with about 60,000 people living with HIV. In contrast, UNAIDS estimates 16,000 people in Australia are living with the HIV virus even though it is four times the size of PNG. According to AusAID it is estimated that if HIV interventions remain at current levels in PNG there will be 500,000 people living with HIV, and 3000,000 adult deaths by 2025. Sobering!

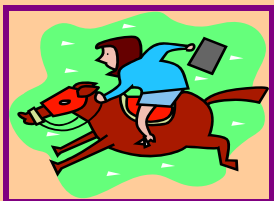
Johnny Cash once sang to a group of prisoners at a prison in California, raising the roof with a memorable performance that was recorded on the album At Folsom Prison. Now, some 40 years later and half a world away, a group of prisoners sing to their fellow inmates for a different reason. The prison is near Port Moresby, the songs they are singing are about HIV and the terrible impact it is having on their nation. Playing musical instruments and carrying a sign **'Stand up and be counted,'** ten inmates commence their show. Intermingled with their songs are inspirational performances about gender inequality – how women are 'gifts of the Lord' and should be respected. One of the three dramas performed for the 600 odd inmates, depicts a polygamous man who becomes infected with HIV and passes it on to his wives, who consequently die, leaving their children parentless. The prisoners also perform at a nearby village market. Bringing men into the picture, challenging common behaviour, as the 'edudramas' by Port Moresby's prisoners do, are groundbreaking and a step in the right direction.

The HIV epidemic is one of the most significant threats to PNG's current and future development. 60,000 of the people – almost two percent of these between 15 and 49 are HIV positive. PNG accounts for 90 percent of all HIV infections in the Pacific region. The virus is now firmly established in the general population, affecting men and women equally and although found mostly in urban centres, it has now reached every province, hitting even remote parts of the country.

Gender inequalities are leaving women even more vulnerable. According to Amnesty International, violence against women is widespread and has contributed to the rapid spread of HIV in PNG. Domestic violence is rampant, women lack the authority to negotiate safe sex both within and outside marriage. Rape and gang rape are also very common in PNG and has reached epidemic levels. Women are considered second class to men, resulting in gender and human rights abuse. More women should be encouraged and empowered to take up leadership roles in decision making at the political and community development level to promote equal participation and influence behaviour and attitude change in the male dominated society.

STATUS OF WOMEN SERVICE COMMITTEE

Health Advocacy Committee – Noelene, Chair (Robyn, Julie, Angela, Janine). The committee has received a letter back from Karen Struthers, Parliamentary Secretary, advising that the Gov would not be able to do anything to assist until 2015-20. The Committee is in the process of organising another meeting.

Rotary Boat Show – Sheryn Chair (+Roster) – COMPLETED.

Education and Training – Committee deferred to a later date.

Prevention of Violence against Women: PJ, Chair (Linda, Marie, Suzie). Sharon Rudinski, as an invited guest at the last committee meeting, spoke to the committee on the Rock & Water program. The Rock & Water Program aims to apply a physical/social approach to assist boys and girls in their development to adulthood by increasing their self-realization, self-confidence, self-respect, boundary awareness, self-awareness and intuition. A specific goal for the course is teaching boys and girls to deal with power, strength and powerlessness. The program originally designed for boys only has proved to be also very beneficial for girls. The ultimate goal is to teach skills to deal with self defence, bullying and the prevention of domestic violence in later life for these children.

Zonta Whitsundays could assist in the short term by supporting the training of a trainer outside of the school program, as the school will fund teachers. The 3 day Rock & Water Course offers teachers a new way to interact with boys and girls in relationship to their physical and social development. Physical exercises are constantly linked with mental and social skills. In this way the program leads from simple self defence, boundary and communication exercises to a strong notion of self-confidence. The ultimate goal is to assist in Training a Trainer. Someone with one year's experience teaching the program could go to an advanced 3 day course to enable them to train others which is held once a year. Wendy was not able to gain any support for the program at the Whitsunday Christian College but will endeavour to include them in 2008. It is all down to the teaching staff unfortunately, with no opportunity for Zonta to address the girls.

Cheryl Arthur has volunteered to take responsibility of organising the sewing session and picking up the knitted squares. 17 blankets have been completed so far with another almost finished. HOW did the Whitsunday branch of Zonta International begin?

It all started with Louise Mahony when she was a Councillor with what was then known as The Proserpine Council. Louise had already helped form what is now known as the Whitsunday Women's Service Inc. Last week they held their 10th Anniversary celebrations.

What did women "in need" do before this? Women had to take a chance that someone would hear their cries of help when they were caught in domestic violence or otherwise needed emergency advice and care. Other prominent women supporting women's action in 1997 were Barbara Adamson, Pam McLean, Lineke Hudson and Kim Bells.

What Clubs were available to "thinking women" in their own right? None really unless you include The Wine Club, School Parents and Sporting Clubs. Certainly not Probus, Rotary or The Canegrowers. Women could join the Sailing Club, but when she won a Yacht Race there was not even an Honour Board to record this feat. Even my own locally formed Club 'The Shute Harbour Residents Association' were not ready to have a woman president until recently. I saw the poor results from the general male confrontational attitude to Council turned around when we women used our ability, lateral thinking, charm and tenacity.

What kind of Club should we form? I learnt that women's success attracted criticism from a range of people. It was not just from some of the men in the community. We were out of step with the majority of the Community. We needed to raise the profile of women. Perhaps, I thought, we should have persevered in naming the hill we saved (from where there is a world class view) with our Club name instead of the name of another Club who had minimal input?

From this question came an answer. The Coastal district needed a Club which would attract "Thinking Women" so that we could stem the flow of these people leaving the area through the frustration they felt that they could never make a difference in this Whitsunday community.

Lucy Shows Us How!

At our last meeting Lucy Fraser showed us all just how life-changing being involved in an overseas project can be. She explained in her well prepared presentation the challenges and rewards of living in another culture and having to learn about a very different way of life.

Lucy was reporting back to Zonta on the 10 week World Youth International project she undertook in Peru. She told us about her first experiences in Cusco when she was overwhelmed by the street children, some as young as 4 years, selling everything from postcards to cigarettes on the streets at night. Then she explained about the Childrens Centre where she worked with other volunteers, giving children some basic schooling and supervised play – often their first encounter with formal education. She spoke about her time on Amantini, an island in Lake Titicaca, where she and another volunteer lived with a local family. The island had no electricity, no running water and the living conditions were very basic. All food was collected from gardens which were over an hour away. Her family spoke no English and only basic Spanish, which was enough for Lucy to get by with, as she had taken Spanish lessons before leaving home. Despite these differences, Lucy and her travelling companion formed strong bonds with her adopted 'family'. She admired their generosity and warmth and the way the community worked together. Lucy came home with clearer ideas about what she wants to do with her future.

Lucy is the second young woman to be sponsored by Zonta to undertake a WYI project in Peru and the personal value is obvious. However, as Lucy spreads the word to others in the Whitsundays, there is a broader message – there is a big world out there to be explored and to learn from, and these experiences will stay with you forever. All you need is the courage to 'just do it'.

Fashion Amalgamates In The Whitsundays

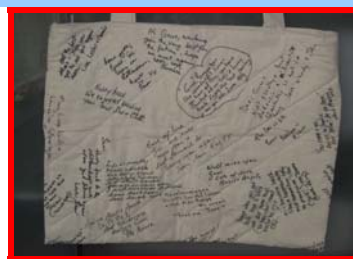
