

NAME OF VILLAGE: BANCOUMANA (MALI)

Who is Nassiga and what does she do?

Nassiga is 13 years of age. Her Birthday is the 13th December. Nassiga and her family live in a poor rural community in the village Bancoumana in the district of Kangaba in Mali - a West African country bordering the Sahara Desert. Mali is one of the poorest Nations on earth.

Nassiga's father is a farmer and her mother a housewife. She has a brother Amadou (1998) 10 years old. The family live in small huts in a compound shared by other members of the family. The house in which Nassiga and her immediate family live has a roof made of straw, walls and floor made of mud and has few windows. They have no furnishings. They use kerosene lamps for light. The women of the family collect wood for cooking the family meals. They have some sheep and goats. The family grows staple crops such as millet, corn, beans- mostly for family consumption although some are sold in the local market. The family normally eats three meals a day, which consist of millet, corn or rice with a vegetable sauce. Sometimes they add dried fish and very rarely fresh fish or meat. Nassiga helps her family fetch water for the house.

There is health facility in the village which the family can attend. Nassiga has been healthy and has not suffered from any serious illness. She attends primary school which is less than 30 minutes away. Her father reports that she enjoys singing and her favorite lessons at school are mathematics, reading and grammar. In the area where Nassiga lives, families participated in or benefited from training for community health workers, training volunteers in communication activities and promoting registration and issuance of birth certificates for children

PLAN PROJECTS FOR THE PAST YEAR

BIRTH REGISTRATION

Increasing birth registrations increases the number of children that can enrol in school. Plan has provided 170 birth certificates and has helped children register for their birth certificates, and has also trained registration agents from each village. Plan facilitated the formation of children's clubs in each village to help this project and to raise awareness in the area of the importance of having a birth certificate. Children participated by organizing a census of all children who were not registered with birth certificates

WATER SUPPLY PROJECT

Plan drilled one borehole and equipped it with a manual pump for easy use. They formed a water committee that received training on how to maintain the pump, and how to keep the area around the pump clean. One mother reported: "Mothers and daughters used to have to walk long distances every day to fetch water. Now we have clean water closer to our homes all year round, and we do not fall sick during the dry season when the wells used to dry up. The water committee taught us how to store water safely. We keep it away from animals and small children."

CAMPAIGN AGAINST MALARIA

Malaria is the main cause of death in Mali and in this area. Plan has been working with one of the first International Research Units located in the area to find a vaccine for malaria. Plan distributed 3,000 insecticide-treated mosquito nets to "at risk" groups, like young children and pregnant women.

THIS YEAR

Plan will train rural councilors on child rights, to better integrate children's priorities in the area development plan. They will facilitate the formation of child protection committees; help to organize

At our last Club meeting Margaret Anderton present a letter she received from one of our past recipients of the YWPA award. Here is what Naomi Barnbaum has been doing since that award.

Dear Zonta.

In 2004, in my final year of secondary school, I was honoured to receive Zonta's Young Women in Public Affairs Award. It was an honour to be awarded when I was surrounded by so many successful, inspirational women. Five years on, I wished to be in touch to let you know how the support from your organisation has contributed to my success today.

My passion has always been the political sphere. Since about the age of 15 I have aimed to serve the Australian people as a public servant. An odd dream, perhaps, for a young girl from regional Queensland but one that was encouraged by Zonta and facilitated by the Young Women in Public Affairs prize. I completed a Bachelor of Arts majoring in History and International Relations from the University of Queensland in 2007, and followed this with an Honours Degree in International Relations in 2008. During my tertiary education, I received 6 Dean's Commendations for Academic Excellence, and was made a Dean's Scholar in recognition of academic achievement. I completed my degree with a grade point average of 6.675 out of a possible 7, and received First Class Honours. I was pleased to accept a job with the Department of Defence, commencing in February this year. Today, I live in Canberra an am thrilled to have the opportunity to engage with foreign policy and diplomatic issues on a daily basis. In a nod to the fact that there is a life outside of the office, I am involved in local theatre and music productions.

In the 21st century, we assume that women in Australia are surely equal. But as I look around my office I see no other women. Parliament is still dominated by men, the corridors of power in the upper echelons of the public service are still walked mainly by men. But the kind of support and leadership offered by the professional women in Zonta is forcing change: the highest political office in our country (that of the Governor-General) is occupied by a woman for the first time, and my own personal role model, Penelope Wensley (who achieved so many 'firsts' for women in the public service) is now serving as Queensland's Governor. The more acknowledgement and support we women give one another, the stronger we are. The support I received from Zonta certainly strengthened my resolve, and facilitated the achievement of my goals.


