A Nostalgic Look Back at Happenings around RVAC from the old "glory" days.....

"A celebrity member of days gone by"

How many of us realize that we have had amongst our members some people who may not have super high profiles but who in their own way have helped shape this "Greta Nation" and promoted GA in a way not otherwise imagined and have been real heroes in their own way?

One such member of this club and one that I would like to share with you now is a past RFDS pilot – Capt. Beth Garrett was the 1st woman RFDS pilot. In Ivan Rudolph's Outback Angels Vol 2 he describes her thus: "She was a forthright but pleasant lady who softened hard words with a ready smile". Beth advises that her recollection is that she wanted to fly from as early as 4 years of age, in 1930.

She had her first flight in the "Southern Cross" piloted, not by Kingsford-Smith, But by one of his colleagues. It mattered not to her. That flight at that tender age sealed her fate. Beth grew up on a sheep and wheat property run by her widowed mother in the Riverina District of NSW and despite a severe shortage of cash they lacked nothing in a loving and emotionally stable family. Beth left home and moved to Melbourne to take up a Secretarial position. When she turned 21, (1947) she started her training and joined the Royal Victorian Aero Club. She waited till then so that she would not have to seek her mother's permission. Her mother was not keen on flying and did not want Beth to take up the challenge and was concerned not only for her safety but "how much it was going to cost".

Beth obtained her licence in 1947 and her Commercial and Instructor rating in 1952. All paid for from her salary and her scrimping and saving, walking to training, hanging out at the Club and wearing for 3 years the same smart blue uniform purchased at Myers bargain basement. Beth married in 1953, a young TAA pilot, Martin Garrett and Martin was seconded to the RFDS in Townsville. Martin described the wood and fabric "Dragon" Biplane operated by the RFDS as a "heap of old junk" and did not like it. It was "gutless and could not maintain altitude with one engine out". Tragically this lack of power coupled with hot and dry conditions at Cheviot Hills Cattle Station in October 1953 proved his fears of the "gutless" Dragon to be correct. On take off, it failed to lift, crashed and Martin, along with Catherine O'Leary (a 22 year old nurse), was killed. It was the RFDS only QLD fatal crash.

Beth's life changed after the death of her one love. She was pregnant and later gave birth to a daughter. Beth was resourceful and got on with her life and stuck to her flying and obtained several flying positions despite her gender which worked heavily against her. After losing her job due to the failure of her employer, after about 4 years from Martin's death, the sun shone on her from the top of the RVAC building. Beth was approached by Air Commodore Paddy Heffernan to be an instructor at RVAC and with 3000 hours under her belt she was to stand out candidate and took the job. The job was described as a well paid, marvellous and allows her to be at home with daughter Catherine.

She trained pilots in Tiger Moths and Chipmunks and during her term she achieved A1 and A1+ Instructor ratings and was qualified to test candidates for private pilot licences. Beth occupied this position for many years and when her daughter turned 9 she decided that the time was right for her to move on and so she moved north to warmer climes. Beth applied for and was successful in obtaining a position with the RFDS. As she explained, the interest was not primarily humanitarian: "rather it was the highest paid job advertised in GA at the time!!" (And here for the benefit of all you envious (or should be envious) members) - Further more the RFDS was using the Beechcraft Queenair - an aircraft that she loved!! "What a woman and why wouldn't she love it - it's the best aircraft on the Australian Register!! (author's prerogative - (but no bias of course!)).

Beth describes flying the Queen Air in atrocious conditions, in the pitch black of night in thunderstorms, in the middle of nowhere and obviously had the utmost faith in the aircraft which never let her down even when it was not as well as it could have been. No matter whether it was night, wet, boggy strips, wild animals, birds, long grass... you name it, it performed. At this point I must stop because the story is long and complex and full of inspiration. I urge all members to buy the reference **Ivan Rudolph's ''Flynn's Outback Angels Vol 1 & 2** to read the rest of the unbelievable story of this magnificent woman also a past member of our club, and other heroines of whom we should all be immensely proud. Beth lives in retirement in Brisbane and was a torch bearer at the 2000 Olympics. *By Tony Taggart*.
